First Capital Connect introduces 12-car peak hour services on Thameslink route

First Capital Connect started the expansion of its passenger capacity on 12th December, by introducing the first 12-car trains on some Thameslink peak-hour services between Bedford and Brighton.

To make this possible, 14 platforms have been lengthened at stations across the route, over 160km of new power cable has been laid to provide, and the power required by longer trains. The vast majority of this work was completed overnight and at weekends to reduce disruption to passengers.

At Farringdon station a new spacious ticket hall came into use to provide the additional capacity that will be required, not only for the longer, more

frequent services made possible by the Thameslink programme, but also future Crossrail services. Farringdon is now set to be transformed into London's newest transport hub, with Thameslink, Crossrail and London Underground services all meeting there from 2018 to provide over 140 trains an hour! At Blackfriars, a new station entrance to the north has now opened, following the new southern entrance that opened on 5th December, and was reported in these pages in last week's issue.

- On the first day of 12-car operation, 12th December, the 08.02 Thameslink service from Brighton to Bedford arrives at Blackfriars, consisting of Class 377/5s Nos. 377521, 377502 & 377510. Bill Turvill
- ◀ The opening of the new ticket hall/ entrance hall at Farringdon allows for the temporary closure of the original Grade II listed London Underground entrance for refurbishment. The programme includes opening up the entrance to create more space and a direct link into the new **Turnmill Street concourse on the eastern** side. The station will remain open during the closure with London Underground passengers being redirected to use the new Turnmill Street concourse, with **First Capital Connect Thameslink route** passengers being directed towards the newly opened ticket hall. The newly refurbished London Underground entrance is scheduled to reopen on 6th February 2012, and from then on passengers will be able to use all three entrances into Farringdon station. **Brian Morrison**



HS2 would attract investment says the majority of Scottish businesses

Almost three quarters of Scottish businesses believe high-speed rail would attract new investment to Scotland, and business, transport and civic leaders have begun a case to have high-speed rail extended beyond the north of England.

The Scottish Partnership Group for High Speed Rail, formed by Minister for Housing and Transport, Keith Brown, has published a report detailing the benefits for business, communities and the environment, and a survey carried out by the Group found that 72.5% of Scottish businesses believe it would attract new investment. The Fast Track Scotland document also reports that the line would benefit Scotland to the tune of around £24.8 billion. Introducing the document, Mr Brown said: "The argument for a high-speed rail network in the UK is strong, but it is stronger when Scotland is included. That is the clear

message from this report and one that the Scottish Government fully backs. This report sets out in very real terms, just how beneficial it would be on so many fronts to have the high-speed rail network extended to Scotland." The Partnership Group brought together Glasgow and Edinburgh city councils, Network Rail, Scottish Chambers of Commerce. Transport Scotland and a number of other bodies chosen to represent the widest possible cross-section of Scottish civic and business life - and it calls for the remit of the HS2 company, formed by the Department for Transport, to provide detailed planning for the proposed line to be extended to Scotland.

The report concludes: "It is imperative that high-speed rail is developed in the UK. It is also imperative that Scotland is included if the UK is to see the full benefits of its contribution to the economy".

Work underway at Three Bridges site

Work has started on a state-ofthe-art rail operating centre at Three Bridges, which will become the nerve centre of operations in Sussex.

The new centre is one of three major projects either underway or planned for Three Bridges. The other schemes are the construction of a maintenance depot for the new Thameslink trains, which is due to begin in early 2012, and a series of improvements to the station and subway that are currently being carried out. The operating centre will become one of 14 planned across the country over the coming years. Major construction of the Three Bridges

centre is expected to be completed by early 2013. The station improvements mentioned include a new waiting area and toilets on Platforms 3 and 4, relocating the ticket gates, and better drainage in the car park.

The Thameslink depot will be 11,200 square metres, and is due to come into operation from 2015. In addition to the main depot building, which will be able to take up to five 12-car trains at a time, the site will include a warehouse and office space, train cleaning equipment, sidings for stabling trains overnight, an electricity substation and a staff footbridge. New car and cycling facilities will also be built for the staff.



▲ The second anniversary of the start of Southeastern's High-Speed Class 395 services was marked on 13th December. Over 8.2 million passengers were carried in the second year of operations, an increase of a million compared with the first year. The high speed operation has also expanded to meet local passenger and stakeholder demand, with additional services starting from Maidstone West in May and then subsequently from Sandwich and Deal in September. Similarly the service proved vital to the successful hosting of The Open Golf tournament at Royal St George's with 37,000 spectators travelling by train. Here, Class 395 'Javelin' No 395019 departs from Dover Priory on 11th May, forming the 15.44 Southeastern HS1 service to St Pancras International. Brian Morrison

West Hampstead Thameslink opens to the public

The new Thameslink station at West Hampstead (illustrated on page 6 of last week's issue) opened to the travelling public on 14th December, providing passengers with improved access to the station, less congestion, more capacity and easier interchange with nearby Underground and Overground services.

The entrance in Iverson Road links to a new footbridge with lifts to all platforms, providing step-free access at the station for the first time. The platforms have also been lengthened to

accommodate 12-carriage trains. The new entrance is now alongside an embankment that has been built up to allow the pavement to be widened from 1.5m to 12m. The existing lime trees have been incorporated into the new public space, and the new station can be seen clearly from West End Lane, which is a key design objective.

A green tiled wall, designed to reflect the changing colours of the lime trees, provides an interesting feature on the station approach, brightening the walkway while also drawing people towards the station.

- Network Rail has joined forces with DB Schenker to transport furniture destined for its new national centre in Milton Keynes from the continent - saving around 100,000km of lorry journeys. A high number of desks, chairs and tables made by furniture supplier Vitra, based in Weil am Rhein. Germany, will be transported by train from nearby Basle in Switzerland to Hams Hall freight terminal in Birmingham in early 2012. The combined length of wagons required to move the furniture is more than half a kilometre!
- Freightliner's latest newbuild locomotives, Nos. 70014-70017, arrived at Newport Docks on 17th December, aboard the ship BBC Colorado. Unloading started almost immediately.
- Freight operator I.G. Russell has exercised a break clause in the contract to run the Telford International Railfreight Park (TIRP) at Donnington, near Wellington, according to the Shropshire Star newspaper. The facility was opened in 2009, but Russells are reported to have said that the loss of a coal contract meant that it was bearing losses on the operation of the facility that could not be sustained. The report adds that Telford & Wrekin District Council are paying Russells £2,250 per week to continue to run TIRP, which until recently was

- used to store several Class 508 EMUs, all of which have recently been transferred to Eastleigh for further storage. The only other traffic seems to be Ministry of Defence workings to the nearby Army Depot. A new operator is being sought.
- The winter timetable for London Midland brought in several changes from 11th December, including the addition of new services and extra coaches on some of its established ones. Among the changes is the provision of an extra 686 seats per day on Walsall trains, 153 seats per day on Shrewsbury services, and 604, 531, 157 and 177, respectively, to and from Leamington, Stourbridge, Hereford and Stratford-upon-Avon. Some Chase Line peak services will have an extra coach, as will two early morning trains to Birmingham that will now start from Rugeley instead of Hednesford.
- 'Access for All' Improvements at Sutton Coldfield station costing £2 million have ensured Birmingham's Cross-City line remains one of the most accessible rail routes in the country. With its new lifts and upgraded footbridge, the station has become the 19th out of 24 stations on the route to be equipped for step-free access, and work is already underway at two more at Selly Oak and Northfield.

Major upgrade to take place at Peterborough with new platforms

A £43 million upgrade of Peterborough station, heralding longer, more frequent trains, extra platforms and new footbridges and lifts has been announced.

Over four million people use the station each year, and this number is set to rise dramatically, with the number of people travelling between the city and London forecast to double over the next 25 years. The investment will provide the extra capacity needed to cater for the forecast growth in passenger numbers on all routes to and through Peterborough, and also paves the way for new services to new destinations such as Gatwick Airport.

When finished in December 2013, the station will have a modern main building, extra platforms to increase capacity and reduce congestion, easier access thanks to new lifts, and longer platforms ready for new, longer trains serving more destinations.

Peterborough is a major rail

interchange, served by a complex mix of commuter and long-distance services travelling both east-west and north-south. Network Rail's redevelopment will increase capacity through the station, with two new platforms constructed on the west side for use by trains travelling on east-west routes, freeing up the existing platforms for north-south services.

Platform I which is a bay platform at the south end, will be removed as the current platform 2 will be extended and renumbered to become Platform I. Platform 3 (that becomes Platform 2) will be widened and a new platform (the new Platform 3) added for future London-bound high-speed services. The main station footbridge will be updated and extended to serve the new platforms, with lifts providing step-free access between the station entrance and all platforms for the first time.

In addition to the new platforms, Platforms 2 and 3 will be extended

to facilitate future 12-car Thameslink services, which will provide direct connections from Peterborough to London and destinations across the South East. Platforms 4 and 5 will be extended in readiness for future Intercity Express services, which will provide new trains on long-distance routes to the north of England and Scotland and two new platforms, to become 6 and 7, will be built. A new goods loop will also be created to the west of the station to increase freight capacity on the key cross-country route from the port of Felixstowe to the Midlands and beyond.

Work has started to clear the land to the west of the station in preparation for major works to be carried out starting in April 2012. In addition to the £43 million project, work funded by East Coast and Network Rail has already begun on a £3 million scheme to make the station brighter, provide bigger entrance and a larger concourse.

Metro and Light Rail News

Contract to build new Nottingham tram routes awarded

Tramlink Nottingham has been awarded the contract to complete a major expansion to the city tram system. Work is set to start in the New Year on the £570 million project to provide two new lines and expand the existing network by 17.5 km.

Comprising three major international companies, two leading equity investment partners and a top flight local bus company, Tramlink will immediately take over the operation of the existing Nottingham Express Transit (NET) Line One, which has been open since 2004.

Chairman, Roger Harrison, said: "We have put together a world-class partnership and we are confident of being able to create a network which will not only be

efficient and effective in terms of meeting the city's transport needs but which will also help to take Nottingham's international status to a new level".

The Tramlink Nottingham
Consortium includes Alstom, Taylor
Woodrow, Keolis and Wellglade
(owners of local bus operator
Trent Barton) as well as Meridian
Infrastructure and Infravia Fund
as financial investors. After an
extensive tender period, Tramlink
was selected as preferred bidder
in March, and since then work has
been underway finalising details of
the 23-year concession contract.

When complete, the system will serve 20 of the 30 largest employers in Greater Nottingham, and help to create a first class transport interchange at Nottingham station, itself the

subject of a major £67 million redevelopment project. It is planned that passenger services across the whole of the expanded tram network will be fully operational by the end of 2014.

Alstom will draw on its expertise in infrastructure and turnkey projects for the construction of the new track, power, signalling and the supply and maintenance of 22 Citadis trams as well as the maintenance of the existing 15 Line One trams. The contract is the first tram project in the UK for Keolis, and reinforces the group's position as the world's largest tram operator.

NET Phase Two is funded by Nottingham City Council, the Government, and through a combination of tram fare revenue and a Private Finance Initiative arrangement over the life of the concession. The Government provides approximately 66% of the estimated £570 million cost. and the remaining 34% comes from Nottingham City Council, mainly through the Workplace Parking Levy, which is a charge on employers based in the city that provide II or more car parking places for employees.

Glasgow subway celebrates 115th birthday

Passengers who travelled by the Glasgow Subway on 14th December received a number of special treats as the network celebrated its 115th birthday.

The day-long celebration included a year's free Subway travel for one lucky traveller, along with free ticket offers for 115 other Subway winners, 115 chart album giveaways, an 8GB lpod Touch, complimentary cupcakes and much more. The prizes, courtesy of the Evening Times and Capital FM, marked the anniversary of the Subway, which opened in 1896.

Originally built for the Glasgow District Subway Company, it was the third underground railway in the world behind London (1863) and Budapest (1896) but the only one to be hauled by a giant cable. Strathclyde Partnership for Transport, which now owns and operates the system, has begun a multimillion pound modernisation project to ensure the Subway remains at the heart of the city for generations to come.

The Subway had a low-key opening on its first day, but as word spread thousands queued outside stations to experience travel by a non-steam train for the first time. The original clutch-and-cable system, with one cable

for each direction, was driven from a steam-powered plant on Scotland Street, between West Street and Shields Road stations.

In 1923 the Subway passed into the hands of Glasgow Corporation Transport Department and was converted to electric traction in 1935. It ran with little further change until 1977, when the new operators, Greater Glasgow Passenger Transport Executive, closed it for two years to allow for major modernisation. The Subway in its present form reopened for operation in April 1980. Now part of Strathclyde Partnership for Transport, it is one of the few railways in the UK remaining in public ownership and 'vertically integrated', where SPT responsibility covers all aspects of operation and infrastructure. The route is a loop almost 6.5 miles long, and extends both north and south of the River Clyde. The tracks have the unusual narrow gauge of four feet and a nominal tunnel diameter of 11 feet, even smaller than that of the deep-level lines of the London Underground. The system is unusual compared to other metro systems, as it has never been expanded from its original route in more than 100 years.

Croxley rail link finally gets go-ahead

The long-running £120 million Croxley Rail Link project has now been approved by the Government.

The new link will connect Croxley station on the Metropolitan Line with the currently disused track between Croxley Green and the overground Watford High Street station. A large rail bridge will run from Baldwins

Lane in Croxley Green, past the Harvester restaurant and over the dual carriageway. The new railway will then run along Watford Road, the Grand Union Canal, and through west Watford, where two new stations are scheduled to be constructed in Ascot Road and Vicarage Road.

The extension to the 'Met' should be open by 2016.

First Norwegian GBRf locomotives arrive in Great Britain

The first five of the Mak/ Siemens (Vossloh) locomotives purchased by GBRf from CargoNet in Norway were expected to arrive at Tees Dock on 18th December. The remaining five are due to be delivered in mid-January.


A total of 10 Bo-Bo 2,100hp locomotives, originally built in 1996/1997 and equipped with Caterpillar engines, have been purchased for use on internal shunting duties at the SSI Lackenby works in Redcar. The locos will be

maintained at Lackenby on behalf of GBRf by Electro Motive Diesels.

Following on from our report in the last issue relating to the new DH50 locomotive now at the Celsa Works in Cardiff and working for GBRf, it is confirm that the locomotive is not a demonstrator as previously noted, but is one of two refurbished engines hired by the company for a period of five years from Hunslet Engine Company (itself part of LH Group Services) at Barton-under-Needwood. The locomotive is currently being used

for driver and maintenance training, while the second loco is due to be delivered in mid-January. Once both are proven, the two Class 08s currently based on site will be moved to other GBRf locations.

In addition, the Class 09 locomotive operating at Barton Dock, Manchester, No. 09002, is confirmed as being owned by GBRf, having been refurbished by Hunslet Engine Company, along with classmate No. 09009, which will be used by GBRf at an undisclosed location in the new year.







First branch of the high-speed LGV Rhin-Rhone route opens to services

French high-speed route or LGV (Ligne Grande Vittesse), the first section of the Eastern Branch of LGV Rhin-Rhone.

The 140km section

from Villiers Le Pots, near Genlis, Dijon, to Petit Croix, near Mulhouse on the French-Swiss border, has a line speed of 320kph (200mph) and cost €2.3 billion.

Extensions from Villiers Le Pots to Genlis (15km) and Petit Croix to Lutterbach (35km) on the outskirts of Mulhouse will complete this 190km route once funding has been agreed. The planned Western and Southern branches will provide direct LGV north and south facing connections from Dijon and the Eastern Branch to the existing LGV Sud Est from the Mediterranean to Paris, with onward links to the UK, and the Benelux countries.

New out of town stations have been built at Belfort-Montbeliard and Besancon with a new €20 million Technicentre Alsace at Mulhouse with servicing facilities for six TGV sets.

In addition to speeding up existing domestic services to Paris and between Strasbourg, Lyon and the Riveria, the line will open up new opportunities linking the south of France and Spain with southern Germany and north west Switzerland.

Daily services will operate from next year between Frankfurt, Lyon and Marsaille, and also between Basle and the south of France, and SNCF has ordered 30

Euro Duplex TGVs that will be capable of operating through to Germany, Switzerland and Spain. In addition, by 2015 the company will have refurbished the 60 Sud Est TGV sets that provide domestic services.

The new high-speed services will inevitably draw traffic from the existing routes that rely more on Regional TER services, particularly on the Mulhouse-

Belfort-Besancon-Lyon corridor. The locohauled Strasbourg to Lyon services have been withdrawn, and dieselhauled services between Paris and Mulhouse on the former Paris to Basle line will now only operate as far as Belfort.

The two daily locohauled Brussels to Zurich services have been retimed for 200km running, with motive power now being provided by SNCF Class

26000 locomotives. This has brought to an end, the final duties for the remaining Strasbourg Class 15000s, a class that has been associated with express passenger workings in eastern France for nearly 40 years since their introduction in 1972. Following the change in diagrams, the remaining 15000s have been reallocated to duties around Normandie and Paris Nord.

Prior to the commencement of a new freight flow, GBRf operated a series of route learning trips between Derby and Burton-upon-Trent, heading as far north as Lincoln and Barnetby. While four out of the five trips were operated by Class 66/7 No. 66739, Class 20/3s Nos. 20301 and 20304 were used for the final working. The '20s' had been operating around North Lincolnshire earlier in the week, on route learning duties into Immingham. Here, No. 20304 leads its classmate through Lowdham on 2nd December, with the Burton - Lincoln section of the diagram. John Illingworth

Railtour Spotlight

As this will be the last railtour spotlight until mid-January, may we first of all wish every reader a Merry Christmas, and a very Happy New Year.

Steam action dominates over the festive period, with four tours operating on the run up to Christmas Day, and then one important working before the end of year. Steam Dreams sets the ball rolling on 19th December when it takes No. 60163 Tornado from Basingstoke to Norwich, working via West London, Cambridge and Ely. Two days later and there should have been two mid/late morning departures from London Victoria, starting with No. 70013 Oliver Cromwell on Railway Touring Company's 'Sussex Belle'to Hastings, and back to London, however, this train has now been cancelled, leaving No. 35028 Clan Line (working as No. 35017 Belgian Marine) as the only steam working on 21st December, as it heads a VSOE British Pullman Christmas Luncheon train from the Capital, booked for the usual Surrey Hills route, via Guildford and Redhill.

Finally, Steam Dreams brings down the shutters on the pre-Christmas festivities with the 'White Cliffs Luncheon Circular' on 22nd December, with No. 34067 *Tangmere* booked to take the train via Canterbury and Deal (non-stop it is assumed) and then around the coastal route between Dover and Folkestone.

After Christmas there is something of a cracker, with a 'King' from Paddington to Stratford-upon-Avon, via the Chilterns. Just the thing to blow away the post-Christmas

blues? This is a UK Railtours charter featuring No. 6024 King Edward I on the predictably titled 'William Shakespeare', which will take on Saunderton Bank en route to the home of the Bard. After the break, the feature will be tender-first working over the North Warwickshire Line to Tyseley, where after a reversal, the 'King' will again face the right way for the run back to Paddington. A fitting tour for No. 6024 to close 2011, as the locomotive is on the eve of withdrawal for overhaul in a few month's time.

There is little activity in the first two weeks of the New Year, with the exception of a VSOE British Pullman luncheon working around the Surrey Hills with No. 35028 Clan Line on 7th January, followed by Pathfinder's 'Abercot Generator' on 14th January, which as the name implies will be a good old Pathfinder track bash, calling into both Didcot and Aberthaw Power Stations. The train, which will be hauled by a DBS Class 66 starts the day at Bristol Parkway, and then works north via Cheltenham Spa and Birmingham New Street, before turning south to Didcot, then onwards to Birmingham International, Coventry, Leamington Spa, Banbury and Oxford. After a guick trip around the internal circuit at Didcot, the train then visits the Hansenowned Appleford Sidings, before heading west via the requested goods loops at Steventon, Hullavington, Bristol Parkway and Cogan, then traversing one of the internal circuits at Aberthaw. The return to Bristol Parkway includes a trip over the Bishton Flyover. The train returns setting down as outwards.

- An unusual working between London Euston and Birmingham New Street has come to light; a special train chartered by Sky Go Movies is offering free travel to families as part of a promotion for the new Sky products. It is understood that it will be possible to watch films on board via a Wi-Fi connection by way of laptops and I-Pads. The train is booked to run on 22nd December, from Euston in the morning and back from New Street in the evening. Go to www.skyuser for more details of how to obtain free tickets. Ouite what the train will consist of has yet to be clarified, both in terms of stock and traction.
- Budgie Transport is a Lancashire-based travel firm specialising in canal-based holidays, but which in the past through its Residential Rail arm has sponsored steam trips. After a period absent from the charter scene the company has now announced two trips on 7th September under 'The Lancashire Circle' name. Two trains will operate, departing from Preston at around 09.15 and 14.30, picking up at Lancaster, Carnforth and Hellifield, before returning to Preston via Blackburn. There are a number of options passengers can travel on both journeys or make use of a special coach transfer between Preston and Helifield, or viceversa, to undertake just half of the trip. Traction is to be

- confirmed, but most likely from the Carnforth pool. For further details, click here.
- Cruise Saver will again be operating trains from Scotland to Southampton Docks in 2012, to connect with cruise liner sailings. Trains will operate from Edinburgh Waverley and Glasgow Central, from the former picking up at Newcastle, Leeds and Derby and from the latter at Carlisle, Preston and Stockport. In all, 25 trains have been announced, all with balancing northbound workings at the end of each cruise, the first of which will operate from Edinburgh on 21st April, and then with trains each month through to 15th December. each connecting with a specific sailing operated by either Cunard or P&O Cruises.
- The formal main line return of No. 46233 Duchess of Sutherland is now confirmed for the evening of Wednesday 28th March, with a 'Night Owl' working from Derby to Crewe, via Lichfield and the Trent Valley. The train will commence diesel-hauled from Hathersage at provisionally 16.20, and Chesterfield at 16.45. The steam departure from Derby will be around 17.45, with an estimated return arrival at 23.15. Fares range from £55 First Class to £45 Standard, and there will be a real ale bar and sandwiches available on the night. To book telephone 01773 743986 between 09.30 and 16.30.

ECML weekday steam is back - but only for DB Schenker

Network Rail says that following discussions with charter train operators, it has started to relax its rules on weekday steam operations on the East Coast Main Line.

Steam charters over the route were previously banned between London and the Scottish border on weekdays following the delays and severe disruption caused by a light engine movement from York to Southall in September. The movement of BR Standard 7MT Pacific No. 70013 Oliver Cromwell and SR 'King Arthur' No. 30777 Sir Lamiel, brought chaos to the route when several lineside fires were started by the 'King Arthur', resulting in the movement being terminated at Newark Northgate and No. 30777 removed by road to Loughborough.

Discussions have been ongoing with the two steam operators, DB Schenker and West Coast Railway

Company, over how weekday steam is operated and can be managed on the ECML, and Network Rail says that several issues have now been resolved with DB Schenker that have provided NR with the confidence to allow steam operations. Sources have told *Railway Herald* that the main areas for discussion were related, in part, to Fitness To Run examinations and how such exams are carried out, together with traincrew assessment and competancy issues.

The relaxing of the restrictions does not, however, apply to West Coast Railway Company at the present moment in time. Network Rail has confirmed that the company has submitted various information and documentation to support its case for a relaxation in its restrictions on operating weekday steam on the ECML, and says that it will be discussing the issue with WCRC further in the New Year.



▲ The ability for West Coast Railway to run over the core ECML route will be discussed with Network Rail in the New Year, meanwhile, the current restrictions remain in place. On 15th December, LNER 'A4' Pacific No. 60019 Bittern, still running in the guise of long-lost classmate No. 4492 Dominion of New Zealand, approaches Colton South Junction with RTC's 'York Yuletide Express' from Norwich, the steam conveniently blowing down to hide the diesel behind the A4! The train was routed from Peterborough, via Lincoln and Gainsborough to Doncaster, and then via Knottingley and Church Fenton, to York. Unusually, it was 'topped and tailed' by WCR Class 47s, with the steam purely added to the front. On this occasion, the second tender was not used following a recent problem with a hot box. RTC traverses rare routes for steam haulage

On the face of it, the Railway Touring Company's 'Lincolnshire Poacher' on 3rd March is a straight forward London King's Cross to Cleethorpes charter, except that this could not be further from the truth, as it is actually an exploration of some of the remoter lines of South Yorkshire!

With 'Britannia' No. 70013 Oliver Cromwell in charge, the run to Retford is quite straight forward, picking up at Potters Bar, Stevenage, Huntingdon and Peterborough en route. However, at Retford, instead of travelling north over the East Coast Main Line, the train will delicately traverse the sharp curves that connect the ECML to the Worksop line at Whisker Hill Junction. It then continues via Shireoaks, to join the old South Yorkshire Joint Railway at Brancliffe East Junction, and heads north via Maltby Colliery, avoiding Doncaster and joining the old Manchester, Sheffield and Lincolnshire railway route via Scunthorpe, Barnetby and Grimsby to Cleethorpes.

The departure from the seaside resort will be diesel-hauled with No. 70013 at the back for a visit to the New Holland branch, where after a reversal, *Oliver Cromwell* will again take charge to return the train to Peterborough, via Market Raisen, Lincoln, Newark Northgate and Grantham. It then returns to King's Cross diesel hauled from Peterborough.

A week later, and Cleethorpes is the originating point for RTC's 'The Tynesider', headed again by No. 70013 Oliver Cromwell, which additionally picks up at Grimsby, Barnetby, Scunthorpe, Crowle and Hatfield & Stainforth, before avoiding Doncaster to reach York, via Wakefield Kirkgate. The train heads north along the ECML

to set down at Durham and Newcastle, and has the option for passengers to stay on board for a run around the Blyth and Tyne. The return is steamhauled to York, where a diesel will take over for the return to Cleethorpes. The following day, RTC offers a complete change of scenery and traction, with No. 34067 Tangmere scheduled to head out of London Waterloo to visit both Bath Spa and Bristol Temple Meads. The train is routed out along the South Western main line via Surbiton, picking up at Woking, Basingstoke and Salisbury, before turning north for Westbury and onto Bath Spa and Bristol. The same two destinations feature also in the company's 22nd March working from Three Bridges, again with Tangmere, which will call at Haywards Heath, Preston Park (for Brighton), Hove and Worthing before continuing via Fareham and Eastleigh to Salisbury, and then again north through Westbury.

March will be a busy period for No. 70013 Oliver Cromwell, as it features in RTC's 'The Heart of Midlothian' on 17th March, and the 'Auld Reekie' on 24th March. The former starts dieselhauled at Huddersfield, and picks up at Dewsbury, Leeds and York, where the steam section commences through to Edinburgh Waverley, following the ECML throughout. The return is diesel-hauled, leaving Oliver Cromwell in Edinburgh and in position for the following week's 'Auld Reekie', which operates outwards from Manchester Victoria to Edinburgh behind diesel traction, picking up at Bolton, Wigan North Western and Preston, before heading northwards over both Shap and Beattock. The return steam section mirrors this routing, with No. 70013 doing the honours throughout back to Manchester Victoria.

Learn to drive a steam locomotive at MOSI's Steam School

The Museum of Science & Industry, Manchester (MOSI) has begun a Steam School as one of several unique gift ideas.

Trainees on the Steam School will learn how to drive the historic Agecroft No. I steam locomotive as well as its battery locomotive, and to shunt wagons around the Museum site (the former 1830 Liverpool Road station, the world's oldest passenger railway station). Other unusual gift ideas at MOSI include a photography workshop by acclaimed Manchester photographer Andrew Brooks on 10th January. The School will run from February, although tickets are available now for the experience as a gift for Christmas.

Railway Officer, Matthew Jackson, said: "It is a wonderful experience to drive a steam locomotive around this historically significant site. The sight and the smell of the steam on a cold

winter's day are evocative of another era, and you really get to appreciate the work involved in powering this magnificent piece of engineering. This is a unique gift for anyone who is intrigued by old machinery, trains or unusual forms of transport".

Agecroft No. 1 was used to shunt coal between Agecroft Colliery and Agecroft Power Station, and has recently been painstakingly restored by MOSI. The 28-ton loco was built in Newcastle in 1948 and can haul well over 1,000 tons. It was one of three Swinton-based locomotives used by the British Electrical Authority to service the power station until the early 1980s.

The gala will also feature the debut of USATC S160 No. 6046 in preservation, while at the same time saying farewell to

large Prairie No. 5199, which will be returning to the Llangollen Railway after a three-year stay in North Staffordshire.

All trains to Cauldon Lowe will be banked, and a demonstration freight train will make two round trips between Kingsley & Froghall and Leekbrook on both days. Also, both the locomotive and carriage works will be open to visitors.

Should you not feel able to wait that long, the CVR will also be operating two round trips from Kingsley & Froghall to Cauldon Lowe on 28th & 29th December.

Recognition for DPS and plea for help to finish Tulyar

The Deltic Preservation Society has won the Rail Express Modern Traction Award, presented as part of the Heritage Railway Association Annual Awards 2011.

The award as been given for working with 'Locomotion' at Shildon and the East Lancashire Railway to host the 'Deltic Gathering' celebrations that marked the 50th Anniversary of 'Deltic' locomotives, and in particular for bringing together the surviving seven locos at Shildon.

Peter Kenan, Secretary of the DPS, said it was an honour for the Society to receive the award and that thanks have been paid to all those involved, especially Martin Walker, the KOYLI Group and all the staff and volunteers at the NRM, Locomotion

and the East Lancashire Railway.

The Deltic Preservation Society undertake a major push to complete the restoration of No. 55015 *Tulyar* during 2012, which started back in April 1997. The society is particularly interested to hear from any reader who would like to lend a hand, specifically anyone with an electrical engineering background who would be willing to help rebuild the control cubicles. Alongside this work, the DPS is also preparing No. D9009 *Alyicidon* for the National Network.

Appeal launched to move Class 502 to a new home

The ex-Merseyrail Class 502 EMU, consisting of Motor Car 28361 and Driving Trailer 29896, which has been stored at Tebay for the past few years, has to find a new home, the landlord of the site having given the owning group notice to quit, as it is understood that the site has been sold.

The two-car EMU is owned by the Friends of the 502 Group, to whom ownership was passed from the National Railway Museum when the train was released from the National Collection in 2009, the NRM choosing the Great Eastern Class 306 instead.

A number of possible new sites are being investigated, with the aim of securing covered accommodation if possible, which would go a long way in arresting the deterioration of the unit over the years. However, a more immediate hurdle is the need to raise £4,000. which is the estimated cost of transporting the two vehicles to a new home, and an appeal for donations has been started. Details of how to donate can be found at www.Class502.org.uk.

The EMU is one of a class introduced by the LMS for services around Merseyside in 1939, and the fleet plied its trade through to 1980,

when the last of the class was withdrawn. One unit. was claimed for the National Collection, as the class has some historical importance. and in time it was restored to LMS maroon livery and enjoyed some main line work during, and after the centenary of Mersey Rail operations in 1986. It was based at Southport's Steamport Depot, and remained active on the main line until 1989, when an overhaul became due.

This, unfortunately, was the start of a long decline, there being no money available for the overhaul and the conditions at Southport were not ideal and some structural deterioration set in. This was compounded when Steamport closed, and the only home for the Class 502 that could be found was open-air storage at Kineton. Its situation was crystalised in 2007, when Kineton gave the NRM notice to quit, which resulted in a re-evaluation as to how an EMU should be represented in the National Collection. with the Class 502, now in an even worse state of repair, being discarded.

Enter The Friends, whose society had been formed in 2007 with the express intention of restoring the Class 502 EMU, and now have that very daunting task ahead of them.
